## **Opening of meeting**

The Chair, Councillor Colleen Doyle opened the meeting at 9.18am

#### Apologies and leave of absence

Apologies were noted.

#### Introduction of guests

The ICAC (Inclusive Community Advisory Committee) Meeting Facilitator introduced the guests at the meeting.

#### Madge Sceriha

The Chair, Councillor C Doyle advised of the passing of Madge Sceriha. Councillor Doyle advised that, in honour of Madge, council had no hesitation when it was put to them to have an award named 'Scattering the Seeds for Change'. Councillor Doyle advised that other organisations can contribute funds to this award.

#### COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION FOR COUNCIL'S CONSIDERATION:

That the 'Scattering the Seeds for Change' award be supported.

#### **Welcome to Country**

Professor Gracelyn Smallwood provided the Welcome to Country.

#### **Community Reference Group**

The Chair, Councillor C Doyle advised of a proposal to develop a Community Reference Group. Councillor Doyle advised of the purpose of the Community Reference Group and requested feedback from the committee on having this Group. The Community Reference Group would feed into the ICAC and the purpose is to keep bringing forward issues from the residents.

The committee members provided feedback on this proposal.

#### **Committee Action:**

Councillor Doyle requested the committee members to further consider this proposal for further discussion.

#### **Terms of Reference Finalisation**

The ICAC Meeting Facilitator provided an update on the finalisation of the Terms of Reference for ICAC. Post meeting an approved communication will be issued to the Townsville community.

The ICAC Meeting Facilitator advised that a marketing plan is being prepared for the following council advisory committees:

- Inclusive Community Advisory Committee;
- Arts and Cultural Advisory Committee; and
- Community Safety Advisory Committee.

The committee members provided the following suggestions on raising awareness of the Inclusive Community Advisory Committee:

## Results of visioning and committee member hot topics - Where to next with plan

The ICAC Meeting Facilitator provided an overview of the results of the visioning and committee member hot topics. The ICAC Meeting Facilitator advised that a simple strategic plan for ICAC is to be developed as a result of the visioning and committee member hot topics.

#### Visioning

  - 4. Collaborative services and planning for inclusion

#### Committee member hot topics

The ICAC Meeting Facilitator provided an overview of the committee member hot topics which included the following information:

Three themes came out:

- our neighbourhoods, where we live, work and play;
- how we feel:
- our employment, education and economy; and
- for our city as a whole.

The committee members discussed this item and provided feedback on what action to take from here.

The ICAC Meeting Facilitator and Chair requested volunteers from the committee to write a draft document/action plan to be presented back to the committee.

#### **Committee Action:**

Six committee members (ICAC Meeting Facilitator, the Chair, Wilfred Reuben, Sheree Bugden, Lynne Derry, Rachel Cook) to write a draft (action) plan to be presented back to the committee.

## TCC Health and Wellbeing initiatives

Council's Community Sport and Recreation Officer provided an overview of council's health and wellbeing initiatives which included the following information:

- brochures tabled at the meeting:
  - 'Active Travel Townsville':
  - 'Low cost fitness activities inside October to December 2016':
  - 'Get Active Expo' Free Entry, Townsville Stadium, 10am-2pm, 22 January 2017;
  - 'Townsville Join our free local walking groups!'
- advice of survey to learn how council can improve its 'Get Active and Healthy Townsville' program.
  - The Community Sport and Recreation Officer requested committee members to distribute the link for this survey as far and wide as they can;
- the Community Sport and Recreation Officer will organise a fairy walk along the river in Annandale.

#### **Items carried over from last term**

The ICAC Meeting Facilitator sought feedback from the committee members on the need for this item.

The committee approved for this item to proceed.

#### **Committee Action:**

#### **New Items**

## 1. Beach access, beach mats and supportive chairs

Cayley Downey provided a presentation on the 'Unlock the Lachs' program, in honour of her son Lachie, and the beach mats and supportive chairs. Ms Downey provided her support to the beach mats and supportive chairs and thanked the committee for their consideration of this project.

The ICAC Meeting Facilitator sought feedback from the committee on this project.

The committee discussed the project and provided feedback.

#### **Committee Action:**

The committee agreed that beach mats and supporting chairs should be further investigated and would like to see a working group established to progress. Cayley Downey, Scott Stidston, Sandra Moore and Tara Parish volunteered to be part of working group.

# 2. Wheel of Wellbeing / Mental Health

Alison Fairleigh provided a presentation on the Wheel of Wellbeing program and tabled copies of an information sheet on the program. The presentation and information sheet included the following information:

- research is showing us how our health and happiness can be significantly enhanced by engaging in certain activities in our daily lives:
- the Wheel of Wellbeing provides a framework, information and activities that can be used in short meetings, half day workshops, full day workshops and eight week programs;
- three people in Townsville are trained in the Wheel of Wellbeing program;
- the program is internationally accredited;
- the service mapping and tool mapping can be made available; and
- trial sites.

Jeremy Audas advised that the Wheel of Wellbeing hub website went live earlier this week and Mr Audas extended an invitation to the committee members to contribute to this.

#### Committee Action:

- That the links that relate to the Wheel of Wellbeing be forwarded to the committee members.
- b. Committee members consider this matter further (including looking at what is already in existence in terms of tools etc) and present back to the committee.

## 3. Reopen boot camp and health and wellbeing

The ICAC Meeting Facilitator advised that recruitment for the Community Safety Advisory Committee is underway and is likely to include a member from Probation and Parole, Queensland Corrective Services. Bootcamps would fit within the Terms of Reference of the Community Safety Advisory Committee. Health and wellbeing activities (such as street parties), do sit within the ICAC Terms of Reference and are to be further discussed with ICAC committee.

Councillor Russ Cook provided an overview of the role and goals of council's newly formed Community Safety Advisory Committee.

#### 4. Crime reduction through community service initiatives

The ICAC Meeting Facilitator read out the following agenda submission from Marthisa Andrews (guest), which is being referred to (council's) Community Safety Advisory Committee:

Queensland Corrective Services supervises persons throughout Queensland who are ordered by courts to perform unpaid community service and are on reparation orders. Corrective Services would like to discuss with council where they stand in supporting the provision of community service workers with community based projects that council manage across the region. Offenders who are on reparation orders can be a great asset in providing the local community with various benefits ie. parks/gardens beautification, cemetery beautification, graffiti removal, recycling projects to name a few. Research suggests that more meaningful projects that demonstrate key benefits for the community can lead to a reduction in recidivism and completion of community service hours are more likely. Probation and Parole are committed to sourcing more meaningful activities for the offenders and giving back to community as part of their reparation.

Requested resolution / support:

- support for the provision of community service workers within the council;
- dedicated projects specifically designated for community service workers on reparation orders; and
- opportunities for offenders to give back to community in a positive way.

Ms Andrews added a further request at the meeting (which will also be referred to the Community Safety Advisory Committee) and provided a further overview of this matter.-

## COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION FOR COUNCIL'S CONSIDERATION:

That a recommendation be made to the Community and Cultural Development Committee that council investigate programs or initiatives that can utilise community service workers to work on council's projects.

#### 5. Next Meeting

The next meeting of the ICAC is scheduled for the first week of February 2017. The venue is to be confirmed.

The meeting closed at 11.45am.
